Introduction

Budgeting for study abroad can be tricky without knowing what kind of expenses you might run into or the actual cost of living in the city. This guide includes some of the major expenses and gives brief examples of some real costs of food, meals at restaurants, and travel.

Unfortunately, it's hard to give suggestions as to how much to budget because every student's situation will be different. Do you have a full meal plan so you will never have to buy food for yourself? Does your dorm or apartment already come with any necessities? Will you live next to classes so you can walk in, or will you have to travel across the city?



Your budget will also depend on how much you actually want or have to spend. You could technically go the entire semester without ever eating 'out' to save money, or you could limit yourself to 20 pounds a week on entertainment, or you could decide you will spend as much as you want to.

The prices given are in pounds, as the exchange rate varies. Currently, the exchange rate is averaging about 1.5 dollars for 1.0 GBP, but you can always find exact rates at: http://www.xe.com/currencyconverter/

There's no getting around the fact that London is an expensive city, but plenty of students (myself included) have studied abroad on a tight budget and still had a great time.
